9th "Future of Remembrance" Forum 2023

History in the present: Social commitment and dealing with family history against the background of National Socialist crimes

Relatives of victims of Nazi persecution, descendants of Nazi perpetrators, people interested in the culture of remembrance and memorial staff are cordially invited to our two-day "Future of Remembrance" Forum at the Neuengamme Concentration Camp Memorial to exchange ideas and network on future issues of remembrance culture.

The 9th Forum on **15 and 16 November 2023** will focus on social engagement against the background of family history under the title "History in the Present": To what extent does one's own family history during National Socialism influence one's personal attitude towards current political and social conditions? What is the connection between one's own commitment against current forms of racism, anti-Semitism and other anti-human ideologies and the experiences and memories within one's own family?

On the first day, before the public part of the forum begins, two staff members of the Hamburg Memorials and Learning Places Foundation will offer a writing workshop for relatives of former concentration camp prisoners who are interested in publishing something about their family history. In this context, relatives will also have the opportunity to exchange ideas with each other.

The general part of the Forum begins in the **early afternoon of November 15** with a conversation with Yvan Mbomo from France. His grandfather, born in the then Spanish colony of Guinea, was an aircraft mechanic who fought on the Republican side in the Spanish Civil War. At the end of the war, he fled to France, where he joined the *Résistance* during the German occupation. He was deported to Neuengamme concentration camp and survived the sinking of the "concentration camp ship" Cap Arcona in early May 1945.

In the panel that follows, we will talk to three children of former Nazi persecutees from Hamburg about their family memories of resistance and persecution in the first years of the Nazi regime, 90 years after the handover of power to the Nazis. What role does resistance to the rise of the NSDAP and early persecution during the Nazi era play in the political and social engagement of members of the second generation? How do the descendants perceive the rise of radical right-wing parties and positions in Germany and Europe?

The continuities of German history are also a topic of the **public evening event in Hamburg-Bergedorf**. Survivors and victims as well as their relatives have been fighting for many years to ensure that victims of right-wing violence are publicly remembered and that anti-Semitism and racism, against Roma and Sinti and other groups, are resolutely opposed. What connections can be made between Nazi terror and right-wing violence after 1945 in Hamburg and elsewhere in Germany? What kind of commitment is there on the part of those affected and

their descendants? In a panel discussion with descendants of Nazi persecutees and perpetrators, we will talk about continuities, memories and struggles.

For two years now, a panel series of the Forum has been dealing with the cultures of remembrance in different countries. On the **morning of November 16**, the culture of remembrance in Poland will be examined from the perspective of descendants of former Polish concentration camp prisoners. In this context, we will talk, among other things, about the relationship between Polish remembrance policy and social and family remembrance. To what extent have the general conditions for remembering political persecution by the Nazi regime changed with the political and social upheavals in Poland?

Representatives of the associations of former Neuengamme concentration camp prisoners and their relatives from various European countries travel to the "Future of Remembrance" Forum every year. In a short round, they present their current activities. Afterwards, the participants of the Forum have the opportunity to visit the tables of the associations at a "market of opportunities", to inform themselves about their projects and to talk to the relatives present.

After lunch, we will talk with the granddaughter of a Nazi perpetrator and the great-granddaughter of a follower of the Nazi regime about different artistic approaches in their confrontation with the guilt and responsibility of their ancestors: Solo theatre with a puppet on the one hand, scenographic adaptation of a diary on the other. What questions and themes are at the centre of their artistic explorations? In what way and by what means do they negotiate their relationships to their relatives?

In recent years, the unexpected return of the belongings of former concentration camp prisoners ("Effekten") — a watch or a ring, for example — has triggered great emotion in families. In the last panel of the Forum, we talk with two relatives of Polish and Spanish concentration camp prisoners about their relatives' fate, the significance of the return of their personal belongings and their commitment to remembrance culture. A historian explains the path of the personal belongings and provides information about their significance for families and the culture of remembrance in Spain.
